

Information Leaflet EUROPEAN MIGRATION NETWORK (EMN)

What is the EMN?

The European Migration Network aims to provide upto-date, objective, reliable and comparable information on migration and asylum to support policymaking in the EU. It also provides the general public with such information through its website: <u>http://ec.europa.eu/dgs/home-affairs/what-we-</u> <u>do/networks/european migration network/index en.h</u> <u>tm</u>.

Who is involved?

The **European Commission** <u>DG Home Affairs</u>- coordinates the EMN, assisted by two **Service Providers** plus in co-operation with **National Contact Points** (EMN NCPs) in each Member State, and in Norway, who in turn develop a **national network** consisting of a wide-range of relevant stakeholder organisations.

Each **EMN NCP** is appointed by their national government, which results in a variety of types of organisation being designated. These are primarily Ministries of Interior and of Justice, specialised government agencies dealing with migration, international protection and/or citizenship plus Research Institutes, Non-Governmental Organisations and in some cases, the national office of an International Organisation.

The **EMN Steering Board**, chaired by the European Commission and consisting of one representative from each Member State plus Observers from the European Parliament and from Norway, provides strategic guidance on the EMN's activities.

What does the EMN do?

The EMN responds to information needs through **Reports**, **Studies**, **Ad-Hoc Queries**, **Policy Briefs** (EMN *Inform*) and **the EMN Bulletin**. It does not normally engage in primary research: instead, its key strength is to **collect**, **document** and **make**

available, in an accessible and comparative manner, data and information held or collected at national and EU level. It further analyses and synthesises this information to improve its comparability and harmonisation at EU level in order to contribute to evidence-based policymaking. Dissemination of information takes place primarily via the EMN website and publications.

The EMN is a multi-level network: on the European level, EMN NCPs meet regularly, as well as networking and collaborating with other European level agencies and institutions. These include for example, the Commission's Eurostat and Research Directorate General, the National Contact Points on Integration, the Fundamental Rights Agency (FRA), the European Asylum Support Office (EASO) and the European for Management of Operational Agency the Cooperation at the External Borders of the Member States of the European Union (Frontex). The EMN also provides on-going support to the launched EU Immigration Portal.

At <u>national level</u>, each EMN NCP develops a network involving partners within their Member State with expertise in migration and asylum from a wide stakeholder group, e.g. from government, (academic) research community, and NGOs. The national networks aim to secure a close exchange of information with policymakers at the national level, to better understand their information needs, and to enhance the EMN's role in responding quickly to such needs.

In 2014, the EMN established the **Return and Reintegration Experts Group (REG)**. REG aims at increasing operational cooperation among Member States in order to enhance the coherence between the voluntary return schemes and reintegration projects. The REG produces a range of outputs e.g. country

What does the EMN produce?

* REPORTS

The EMN produces yearly Annual Policy Reports, which outline the most significant political and legislative (including EU) developments, as well as public debates in the area of migration and international protection, within the Member States and Norway. Since 2009, these also contribute to the Commission's Annual Reports on Immigration and Asylum, reviewing the progress made in the implementation of asylum and migration policy.



COUNTRY FACTSHEETS

Drawing on information collected and analysed from the Annual Policy Report, the EMN Country Factsheets provide a succinct summary of the main developments in the year in each Member State and Norway, whilst at the same time, presenting an overview of the most recent migration and international protection statistics.





STUDIES

The EMN also produces Studies, on topics (see below) relevant to policymakers at national and EU levels, to meet both long-term and short-terms needs.

HOW ARE STUDY TOPICS SELECTED?

Study topics are selected from proposals made by individual or groups of EMN NCP(s) and/or the European Commission, based on their relevance to policymaking in the Member States and for the Commission and its agencies. Topics may be proposed for in-depth, strategic studies, with long-term relevance, or for shorter, focussed studies to meet a short-term information need. The Steering Board reviews and formally approves the selection of topics within the context of an annual EMN Work Programme.

HOW DOES THE EMN PRODUCE ITS STUDIES?

The EMN first agrees common specifications for its studies, to facilitate better comparability between countries, working closely with relevant policymakers. Each EMN NCP produces a National Report, according to the common specifications and often involving contributions from members of their national network. A comparative Synthesis Report is then produced, bringing together the main findings from the national reports, and placing these within an EU perspective (e.g. by relating to recent policy initiatives).

4. Mixed migration and changes of status.

AD-HOC QUERIES

Ad-Hoc queries are a means by which EMN NCPs and the Commission can collect information from the Member States in a relatively short time on a wide range of asylum- and migration-related issues, e.g. legal migration, irregular migration, borders, return, visas etc. The network produces compilations of the responses to Ad-Hoc Queries, which rapidly assess the perspective of responding Member States in relation to a specific topic.

EMN ANNUAL CONFERENCES AND EVENTS

The EMN, through its national networks, delivers each year an annual EMN Conference plus an extensive range of national events, conferences and roundtables, sharing and disseminating information on topical migration- and international protection-related issues. In 2014, the EMN Annual Conference "Irregular Migration and Return: Challenges and Practices" took place on the 5th and 6th of June in Athens, Greece. The conference brought together over 170 participants, including representatives from EMN NCPs, European Commission, expert bodies, international organisations and national authorities.

POLICY BRIEFS: EMN INFORMS

These provide succinct, key findings and messages to policymakers on a specific topic based on the results of information gathered and analysed by the EMN, for example, from Reports and Studies, or from Ad-Hoc Queries.

EMN BULLETINS

These provide up to date, topical information required by, and of relevance to, policymakers on a quarterly basis. They highlight recent EU and National developments, and relevant information extracted from the EMN's existing knowledge, plus latest published statistics, primarily from Eurostat.

EMN GLOSSARY AND THESAURUS

The EMN Glossary improves comparability by enabling a common understanding and use of terms and definitions relating to asylum and migration. The Glossary draws on a variety of sources, primarily those given in the <u>EU asylum and immigration acquis</u>, and makes these available in the majority of Member State languages. The Glossary has subsequently been used to develop an EMN Thesaurus, which will permit the structured documenting and searching of documents.

EMN STATUS REPORTS

The EMN produces an annual Status Report, reporting on its activities and achievements. The Status Report is adopted as a Commission Staff Working Paper and formally transmitted to the European Parliament, the Council, the Commission, the Economic and Social Committee and the Committee of the Regions.

Where can I find more information?

All EMN reports and studies, including the <u>National</u> <u>Reports</u> and <u>Synthesis Reports</u>, <u>Ad-Hoc Query</u> <u>compilations</u>, <u>Country Factsheets</u>, <u>EMN Bulletins</u> and <u>EMN</u> <u>Informs</u>, are all published on the <u>EMN website</u>.

In each Member State, an EMN NCP consists of at least three experts either from the same entity or from different entities. In the latter case, one entity acts as the national coordinator and, in such cases, it is their details which are given overleaf.
